

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RDC-1 takes on the Ambisyon Natin 2040 Challenge

The Regional Development Council -1 (RDC-1) has manifested its support to the Ambisyon Natin 2040 following its launch early this year. In fact, this has been integrated in some of the major activities of the council such as the State of the Region's Development Conference, CIRCA 2015 last April 2016 where more than 150 participants were present coming from regional line agencies (RLAs), local government units (LGUs), private sector representatives (PSRs), various media outfits, among others.

Likewise, RDC-1 acknowledges the significance of the Ambisyon Natin 2040 as input to the RDP. Thus, various multistakeholder engagement activities were conducted by the Council.

It was part of the activities during the Regional Development Plan (RDP) 2011-2016 assessment and initial consultation last May 2016. The Ambisyon Natin 2040 was considered in assessing the region's status and in the identification of the region's strategies towards the attainment of the vision.

To further beef-up the Ambisyon Natin 2040 and solicit support from stakeholders, the RDC-1 conducted two Ambisyon Natin 2040 provincial caravans cum RDP consultations and one Regional Consultation.

The Regional Consultation was graced by Mr. Carlos Bernardo O. Abad Santos, the Assistant Secretary for Policy and Planning of the NEDA Central Office who emphasized that the Ambisyon Natin 2040 is the aspirations of the Filipinos not just for themselves but the country as a whole.

Aside from these, Region 1 delegates composed of government institutions, private sector representatives, RDC members, NEDA staff and media entities participated in the Ambisyon Natin 2040 Grand Launch which happened in SMX Convention Center, MOA, Pasay City. This gave the participants deeper appreciation and understanding on the long-term vision, and reminded them of their critical role towards its achievement.

A Glimpse of Ambisyon Natin 2040

AmBisyon Natin 2040 represents the collective long-term vision and aspirations of the Filipino people for themselves and for the country for the next 25 years. It describes the kind of life that people want to live, as well as how the country will look like by 2040. As such, it will serve as an anchor for development planning across at least four administrations

AmBisyon Natin 2040 is a picture of the future, a set of life goals and goals for the country. It is different from a plan, which defines the strategies to achieve the goals. It is like a destination that answers the question, "Where do we want to be?" A plan describes the way to get to the destination; Ambisyon Natin 2040 is the vision that guides the future and is the anchor of the country's plan.

AmBisyon Natin 2040 is the result of a long-term visioning process that began in 2015. More than 300 citizens participated in focus group discussions and close to 10,000 answered the national survey. Technical studies were prepared to identify strategic options for realizing the vision articulated by citizens. The exercise benefitted from the guidance of an Advisory Committee








